The spirit, the service and the food will be as delicious, inspiring, and engaging as it usually is. The menu consists of the traditional Seder Plate with all the ritual accoutrements, chicken soup with matzah balls, gefilte fish with horseradish, Cornish game hen with mixed vegetable succotash, potatoes Anna, fruit, dessert and wine or grape juice as well as coffee and tea. There is a vegetarian/vegan option available upon request.

The cost for this Seder meal is \$16 per person for members and \$20 per person for non-members. Children and grandchildren of members under the age of 15 will be admitted at no charge.

Join Us at the Musical Instrument Museum

Sisterhood is hoping that members and friends will join in visiting the Museum of Musical Instruments in Phoenix the weekend of April 13-15. This museum, *located at* 4725 East Mayo Blvd. and open 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily, with a tremendous array of over 15,000 instruments from every part of the globe. It is the finest and most extensive collection of instruments in the world and visitors can actually hear the sounds of most of them, courtesy of a headset provided to everyone with the \$20 admission to the museum. Your self-guided tour enables lingering at will, taking photos of more exotic pieces, while still remaining with your fellow Green Valley travelers.

A delightful cafe in the building offers a global menu and a perfect respite from exploring, and in the evenings, there are special concerts (at additional cost) performed in the acoustically superb auditorium of the museum. Sisterhood is advocating a tour of the museum on Saturday simply because the number of school children visiting during the week often block one's clear view of the exhibits. There are several reasonably priced hotels quite near the museum for you to spread out your sightseeing. Sisterhood's Women's Assistance Project

For over seven years the Sisterhood has helped support the Domestic Violence shelter here in Green Valley called Genesis House. Established in 2007 with only 16 beds, it has now increased to a 50-bed facility and has provided over 80,000 bed nights to victims as young as 2 months and as old as 86.

As vital as the shelter is, just as important is the physical, dental, mental and legal assistance for the victims. Also available is transportation, schooling, employment training and assistance in finding permanent housing.

Tucson Jewish Film Festival, Monsieur Mayonnaise

The Men's Club organized an outing to the Tucson JCC for brunch and a movie on January 21. Mike Finkelstein kindly arranged it, so our group could sit together for what was advertised as a "French brunch". The brunch got mixed reviews with some feeling that the food wasn't plentiful or French enough, to justify the price charged (\$18).

The movie was a whole different story altogether, both literally and figuratively. It told about an Australian artist and filmmakers' search for what his father, lovingly called Monsieur Mayonnaise, lived and did both before and during World War II. Phillipe Mora, traveled in Europe, the United States and Australia tracking down people and places associated with his father, George Mora. The stories are unbelievable but true as are many Holocaust tales. Interspersed among the travels and the information and people Mora discovered were bold, graphic pictures that illustrated some aspect of people and places he encountered. It was as if Mora was going to make a graphic novel like *Maus* but much more colorful and lively.

My favorite account was that of his father and his buddy Marcel Marceau (yes, the famous mime and god-father to Mora) dressed up as nuns and smuggled Jewish orphans out of France and into Switzerland. One of Esther's favorite tales was Mora meeting an elderly child psychiatrist who was one of those boys smuggled out and who went into to child psychology supposedly because Mora's father asked him what he wanted to do with his life. The psychiatrist related how he wanted to help children just like the older Mora did.

In all it was a great movie, a great and moving story, and one that I unabashedly recommend. Ed Brill

Sisterhood's February Program on Fall Prevention

The Sisterhood program on February 20 welcomed Bridget Lehmann to BSTC to address the many facets of fall prevention. Bridget, a certified fitness trainer, nutrition specialist, and integrated health specialist with a broad training in pharmacology; works with every level of physical ability ranging from clients with Parkinson's disease to those who have had a stroke to those who simply want to remain "tastefully" vertical when we rise.

The program began with a series of exercises that can indicate our balance and risk for falls that included measuring response time from sitting to rising to a standing position, walking a short distance and then returning to our seats. The importance of such things as stretching and breathing properly, and focusing on posture while exercising, were emphasized and practiced. Another exercise we practiced was engaging in processing information to illustrate the idea of "mindfulness" when we are exercising. Wearing proper shoes was stressed as well and we were made aware of shoe stores in Tucson which measure and photograph feet to determine special needs. Dick's Sporting Goods monitors how an individual walks on a treadmill to assess the most suitable kind of shoe for that person.

Other aspects of fall prevention included learning how to adjust heights when performing certain tasks, for example, placing some comfortable pillows on our laps to elevate books to an appropriate height so that our necks are not strained while reading that riveting novel, and proper use of aids such as a walker or cane.

Fall prevention continued

Bridget emphasized posture and avoiding/removing any obstacles in the pathways of our home such as area rugs or anything that could be a tripping hazard, as well as ways to ensure safety by adding bars to showers and making sure that spills are promptly cleaned up to avoid slippery areas.

The importance of exercise in maintaining tone and flexibility by devoting daily time to some exercise including walking was another take home message. Handouts were distributed with several manageable exercises for all of us. Good nutrition for bone health was also stressed. Bridget mentioned eating a rainbow of colors at each meal which translates to balancing different colors of vegetables, fruits, meats, and fish, sprinkled with lighter portions of carbohydrates. She emphasized the importance of staying well hydrated to avoid muscle cramping and trying four or five smaller meals a day rather than the traditional three.

A very significant message Bridget left with us is that <u>everyone</u> will benefit from exercise and good nutrition which in turn often translates to sounder sleep at night. We are going to invite Bridget back, perhaps in the late spring, to take us on a food shopping mission (she is often hired by clients to "educate" them in how to purchase healthier foods by really examining labels) and offer a cooking demonstration in our temple kitchen. We hope everyone in our congregation will take full advantage of this opportunity. *Susan Cohen*
