### President's Message

As we move into 5779, please remember this synagogue is a space where we feel a sense of Jewish community and positive Jewish identity -even when it seems the world outside these walls conspired against us. In our stressful lives and during anxious times, Beth Shalom Temple Center is our refuge, and it is our strength.

The point is, we need other Jews around us to live a Jewish life, that, involves community and a place where Jews can connect with each other.

I would like to share a short history of Beth Shalom Temple Center.

In 1984, 27 Jewish residents of Green Valley celebrated Chanukah at the home of Roslyn and David Sirota. The instant camaraderie led to monthly Bagel Breakfast and Jewish festival celebrations held at various locations.

When Helen and Zev Chazanof moved to Green Valley in 1988, Zev volunteered to conduct Friday night Shabbat Services and served as our spiritual leader for many years. Services were held in a meeting room in the Episcopal Church, and it was soon apparent that a home of our own was needed.

With dedication, enthusiasm and hard-earned dollars, the extraordinary corps of volunteers built a center for Jewish life. Beth Shalom Temple Center. We worship, and engage in our festivals, remember our departed, and engage in social and education programs. We are a family.

The warmth extended to all who entered our home and resulted in a larger membership, and we outgrew our original facility. In 2005 with the money in our treasury, a generous grant from one of our members and donations from the membership we expanded our building to include the library/conference room, office, foyer, and a caterer, friendly kitchen. Mortgage free! Our latest improvement was the Chazanof Garden dedicated in 2007.

I believe "Twentieth Century" governance models aren't working in "Twenty - First" century congregations. Synagogue leaders are hungry for change. More and more congregations concluding that today's leaders stuck with yesterdays rules, can't lead tomorrow's synagogues.

Now, I would like to share part of an article I read about a Southeast Texas synagogue on the verge of closing their doors.

"Final days for Temple Emanuel." It's a problem that Temple Emanuel congregants face every week. Although about 115 families still belong to the temple, half of its members are over the age of 75. It's tough to put a number on exactly how much time we have left. Members hope that something-anything can help to save a place that has become more than a place to worship. When we walk in our building we feel the presence of G-D. On Friday nights, no matter what has been going on in our week or our day, we feel the sense of peace. The Temple can't afford a Rabbi, so a congregant must lead the service. As long as there are a few of us who want to maintain this temple, that's what we plan to do. We 're hanging on and are going to keep going.

I personally love being part of the Beth Shalom Temple Center synagogue and family and rather than face the problems of the Texas Emanuel synagogue, I prefer to make changes now.

I believe hiring a part time Rabbi would help our community grow into the future.

We have a wonderful opportunity to explore this issue.

With Board approval, we have arranged for Rabbi Norman Roman to come to Green Valley for a weekend in November to lead our Shabbat Service and Torah Study Group. I hope our complete membership can attend. Our Ritual Committee is planning an exciting weekend. He just retired from serving 30 years as Senior Rabbi at Temple Kol Ami in Detroit. BSTC members, Marilyn and Harvey Biem, still members of Kol Ami, highly recommend him. (For more information, google Rabbi Norman Roman or call me at 520-300-6770)

This will be a great opportunity for our BSTC family to experience a Rabbi leading our Shabbat Service.

Please note; Nothing is being considered for the near future. Budget for the cost of a BSTC Part time Rabbi has already been approved by the Board and approximately 45 members at a special general membership meeting earlier this year. This is just the beginning of a long process.

I wish you and your family a year filled with peace, love, joy and good health. Shana Tova.

Sue Penfil, the instructor is skilled in teaching Hebrew reading with quick and fluid results. She has been teaching in both Reformed and Conservative congregations for the past 10 years specializing in teaching *B'nai Mitzvah* students preparing them to read and chant *Torah* and

Hebrew prayers.

Costs include an upfront fee of \$100 for the twelve classes, as well as a \$15 student fee for a study book, which we have asked the teacher to order in bulk.

### **Preparing For the High Holidays**

As summer winds down, and the back-to-school season approaches, so, too, do the High Holidays. Jewish tradition provides us with several reminders of the upcoming High Holidays and the Days of Awe, as well as several ways to prepare for them.

Actually, preparation for the Holidays starts right after *Tisha B'Av (see* July August *Shofar)*. Beginning on the *Shabbat* following *Tisha B'Av*, we read the first of the seven *Haftarot* of Consolation. These sections, are taken from the Book of Isaiah, a prophet who lived in the time of the Babylonian Exile and consoled Israel with comforting prophecies of the return to Zion, announce Israel's redemption and take us from the low point of the Temple's description and exile, to the high points of redemption

and the hope integral to a new year.

Following the month of Av is Elul and this month is replete with practices helping to sensitize us to the spirituality of the season. Elul is considered a time when G-d is particularly accessible to the Jewish people. The letters in the name of the month itself are embodied in this verse from the Song of Songs:  $Ani\ l'dodi\ v'dodi\ li$  (I am my beloved's and my

beloved is mine), which highlights the loving relationship between G-d and the Jewish people.

It is during *Elul* that traditional synagogues blow the shofar every morning except for Shabbat. There are various tales/reasons for doing this.

Selichot, or penitential prayers but literally meaning forgiveness, is another aspect of holiday preparation during Elul. Interestingly, Sephardic Jews recite prayers for the entire month as an addition to morning prayers. Ashkenazim, however, say the prayer for at least four days right before Rosh Hashanah. This time period is based upon the laws of sacrifice during biblical times and traditionally is first recited at around midnight on the Shabbat before Rosh Hashanah (as long as there is at least four days to its start).

Either way, the tradition of Selichot is supposedly from a legend about King David who was troubled about how the Israelites would be able to truly atone for their sins. G-d is said to have advised him that the people should confess their sins by saying poems and prayers of repentance.

<u>Kever Avot</u>, the custom of visiting the graves of dear friends and relatives in the days prior to Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur is another tradition of the holidays. We at BTSC go during the *Yamim Noraim*, or Days of Awe, the ten days between *Rosh Hashanah*.

With the start of *Tishrei* a month full of holidays begins, the first of which is <u>Rosh Hashanah</u> which literally means "Head of the Year." During the Days of Awe, people examine their behavior over the past year, consider atonement for misdeeds, and seek a closeness with God. Practically, this is done through repentance, reconciliation, and forgiveness.

<u>Tashlich</u> is observed in the afternoon of the first day of Rosh Hashanah, unless it falls on Shabbat. During this observance the theological bent of the services are reinforced in a concrete way. Individuals symbolically cast away their personal sins by

throwing breadcrumbs into a flowing body of water.

The Shabbat between Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur is known as Shabbat Shuvah, the Sabbath of Return. The name of this Sabbath is derived from the first words of the week's haftarah, Shuvah Yisrael, "return, O Israel" (Hosea 14:2). The custom in synagogues in Eastern Europe had been for rabbis to give impassioned pleas for repentance during their sermons on this Shabbat.

The culmination of the ten days is of course <u>Yom</u> <u>Kippur</u>, known as the Sabbath of Sabbaths. <u>Yom</u> <u>Kippur</u> begins the evening before with <u>Kol Nidre</u>. One of my favorite or awe inspiring aspects of <u>Kol Nidre</u>, is the declaration that it is okay to prayer with sinners. I also like the idea that we are to ask forgiveness for our transgressions from each other and

The *Machzor*, the prayer book for the holidays, is replete with poems and prayers expressing the themes of repentance, human frailty and humility before. The musical style of the service also

expresses the momentousness of the day.

The day closes with the Neilah (locking) service whereby

we pray before an open ark asking for one last chance to repent before the book of life is sealed (see last years Sept./Oct. Shofar, [Vol. 22, No. 5] for a more detailed explanation of the Book of Life).

Then, with a lengthy sounding of Shofar called *Tekiah Gedolah*, the service is ended and with many good wishes for a good, healthy, joyful year we head out to Break-Fast.

(<u>Note</u>: the information about the High Holidays came from a multitude of sources both from the web and other synagogue newsletters, to reflect BSTC's "reconformadox" traditions.)

### MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE NEWS




#### **SISTERHOOD**


