MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

I hope that all of you who celebrated the graduations of friends and family this past June had a wonderful time and received a lot of "naches" from your relatives.

When I first started writing this column, I was trying to get some inspiration on what to write.

However, with the recent events in the news, the fighting with Iran, the possibility of nuclear assets being decreased, and the resulting fears engendered by this, my thoughts turn to the fears people in Israel are experiencing, mourning for those who have been killed and recuperation for those injured.

Too, we still mourn the ongoing fighting in Israel and Gaza and the many hostages who are still unreturned. Together with the many reports of antisemitism around the world, it brings feelings of sorrow, sadness, and fear. I, like many of you, wonder when we can look forward to the return of our hostages and the end of hostilities. We also mourn the many victims of antisemitism here and abroad. I am very grateful to our wonderful security team, especially Josh Migdal, who regularly keeps in touch with JFSA's security people and lets us know what's happening.

July is also centered around Independence Day, and we indeed celebrate this. However, without being political, there is worry over the many intrusions on the nation's freedoms. I can only say that we stay informed, remain vigilant, and safe.

As many of you know, the board will not be meeting this July, but behind the scenes, we are working,

MESSAGE FROM RABBI NORM

June 23, 2025. 26 Sivan, 5785.

(I write this message less than 24 hours after United States Military Forces, at the President's directive, attacked the sites in Iran that had been designated by Israeli and other Intelligence sources as the bases of that terrorist-state's nuclear weapons program.)

Two time-related and philosophical/strategic comments run through my mind today:

The first, referring to the State of Michigan, where my wife and I just spent 10 days with family and friends, simply states that "if you don't like the weather you're experiencing right now, just wait an hour or two and it will be different!" The truism holds for the Middle East, as well.

And second, I am reminded of the famous, brave and courageous proclamation of the Zionists who lived in the Yishuv, the Jewish Community in what was thencalled Palestine during the British Mandate and World War II, as they chose to work with the Allies on the one hand, and work against those same governments who denied the potential establishment of the State of Israel on the other, calling out "we will fight against Hitler as if there were no White Paper, and against the British White Paper as if there were no Hitler!"

There is much still to contemplate and analyze, but my initial response to the bombing of Iran (both by the Israelis as prelude and now the Americans) is one of reluctant gratitude. I subscribe to those who see the battle between Israel and her neighbors as part of a larger, even more consequential battle one that has its counterparts today in Russia vs.

Rabbi's Message (continued)

Ukraine (and Europe/NATO), and possibly even within our own country. Democracies, based on progressive, pluralistic, tolerant values vs. autocracies and theocracies that are regressive, intolerant and too-often hate-filled. (Jews somehow always seem to be seen as the ultimate root of the problem . . .)

I have spent much of today reading, researching, and participating in a webinar (that was originally scheduled to be a healing/memorial service for the victims of Boulder and Washington, DC). Permit me to share with you some of the most astute comments and lessons I've found:

The mood in Israel continues to be conflicted - with near-unanimous support and thanksgiving for yesterday's US involvement, but ongoing fear and pain and disappointment, as well. You might know that the typical greeting one gives to another in Israel is "Ma Sh'lomcha (or Sh'lomaich, for a female)?" The response these days, however, is just as typically "Sh'lomi k'Sh'lom 'Ami", in other words "I'm only as

good as the Shalom-wholeness of my People". And our People are broken.

The writer and thinker, Yossi Klein-HaLevi (whose words in print I recommend to you wherever you find him), answered the question this morning of how he and most Israelis felt: "It's actually happened!!!??? We've prayed for so long; and it's weird to be expressing gratitude to those for whom we don't ordinarily express respect."

He continued, "but we can't stop and celebrate. Gaza is still on our agenda, and the hostages are still on our agenda." And, he wondered, what will we be able to do about Bibi?

President Isaac Herzog issued this statement: "In the pages of human history, this is a moment when the principles of liberty, responsibility and security have triumphed; a decisive moment between the axis of terror and evil and the axis of hope."

The leaders of my Movement, the Union for Reform Judaism and the Central Conference of American Rabbis, summarized for many of us: "One need not agree with (all) the policies of the current Israeli or US governments to express genuine gratitude for this dramatic intervention."

B'kitzur (in short), as we say, we may applaud and give thanks for an important, and some would say long-overdue, effort to remove Iran's nuclear threat against Israel and the Jewish People. But we cannot, must not, pause in our other efforts to challenge those who threaten our lives and souls (Jewish and American, indeed of all God's creatures). Those threats might come not only from the Anti-Semites around us, but even from the leaders (yes, Netanyahu and Trump) among us.

Please continue to speak out, demonstrate, express your thoughts, opinions and conscience. We can disagree, and we can do so politely and respectfully.

Send messages of support (financial assistance, if you can) to friends or family or lone soldiers in Israel. Vote, when the opportunity arises. And don't hesitate to ask for my suggestions on how to learn more about the many issues facing us.

(I hope that the heat and summer haven't been too uncomfortable for you. Lynne and I are excited that we will be spending some of July and almost all of

August on a Holland America cruise to Greenland, Iceland, Norway's Fjords, and the British Isles. I will be the Rabbi on board - conducting Shabbat Services, giving some other possible interfaith educational presentations, and supporting the Jewish passengers when needed. We'll see each other in the Fall, as we prepare for Rosh HaShana 5786!)

RESTRICTED (DESIGNATED) ACCOUNTS

While no specification is required, when making a general donation or tribute to BSTC, you may opt to specify that to the general fund, or to some other fund that represents your desires regarding where the money is used.

Following here is a list of the Restricted Accounts we have on our books. Some have been there for a while, and some are new. The money can only be used for the stated purpose if an account is restricted (designated).

- <u>Rabbi Discretionary Fund</u>: This will be a standard Discretionary fund to allow the Rabbi to donate as he sees appropriate.
- Gratitude Fund: This fund was set up in 2024, before Pesach. The price for the Seder dinner was considerably higher than it had been pre-COVID, when we had the Seder in-house, and a member of BSTC donated his time. All we had to pay for was the food. We were concerned that some of our members could not afford the higher price. Some members said "we are grateful that we can afford to allow any of our members to attend ritual events." This fund allows us to subsidize some or all the cost of rituals for our less fortunate members.
- Garden Fund: BSTC does have a budget for property maintenance. However, we may want to do something extra (special) for the garden, and this fund is for this.
- Bikur Cholim (Caring Meals) Fund: Recently, we have had many people whose spouse/partner has passed away. We want to help them through this grieving time by bringing them meals. We have expanded this to include people coming home from the hospital, or other such serious events. A group of us have decided that personally making meals available to help them through this trying time is a meaningful mission. We are thinking to have prepared meals available or give them certificates for Door Dash or the like. We will make food and store it in the BSTC freezer, all marked to indicate whether the meal is low-salt, gluten-free, vegetarian, etc. We will need money to buy the food, containers, and volunteers to help us cook.
- Art Gallery Fund: This one is obvious. While the

Gallery Committee has a budget for expected costs (hanging devices, receptions, honorariums for speakers), the committee chairs can use this fund to enhance the gallery at their discretion.

Membership Fund: This account is set up to support the recruitment of new members to our Temple, through various means of communication outside the temple. It would include, but not be restricted to, on-line, newspapers, radio, and TV informational posts; and meetand-greet with the Community off site, as well as at the Temple.

EATING JEWISH—RECIPE OF THE MONTH



Savory Chickpea Salad Wraps

A refreshing vegetarian dish—perfect for a light lunch or Shabbat prep.

Ingredients:

- 1 can (15 oz) chickpeas, drained and rinsed
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- ½ teaspoon garlic powder
- Salt & pepper to taste
- ¼ cup chopped fresh parsley
- 2 tablespoons tahini or hummus
- Optional: diced cucumber, cherry tomatoes, or shredded carrots
- 4 large romaine leaves or soft tortillas

Instructions:

- 1. In a bowl, mash chickpeas with a fork until chunky.
- 2. Add olive oil, lemon juice, garlic powder, salt, pepper, and parsley. Mix well.
- 3. Stir in tahini or hummus for creaminess.
- 4. Spoon into lettuce leaves or tortillas. Add optional veggies if desired.
- 5. Serve immediately or refrigerate for up to 2 days.
