Now, if you don't actively participate in temple life, you used to be more active, or you just haven't considered it yet, if you care, then this message is for you. Choose to care...

Figure out what's holding you back. Make the decision to be part of this. Decide that you really can make some time to help if you want to. You already know it will enrich your life and the life of others so don't be cynical, apathetic, or just too busy--Just believe.

What is your area of interest? Let me know, and I will be happy to put you in touch with someone who can use your help. Think also about your particular talents. Are you organized and detail-oriented? There may be a role for you on either an ongoing or occasional basis within a committee's activities. Are you creative? Maybe some committee could use your help to enliven what it does.

You get the picture. We can always use your help, however you'd like to volunteer!

The Jewish Journey: America

On Sunday, August 6, following the Bagel Breakfast, the temple is showing and discussing *The Jewish Journey: America.* This film, directed by Andrew Goldberg and narrated by Emmy Award-winning journalist Martha Teichner, traces Jewish immigration to America from the earliest arrivals in the mid 17th century through the impact of Nazi rule, Israel's creation and the challenges of 21st century assimilation.

Through personal stories faced by these immigrants whether they came to escape oppression or for economic opportunity, along with interviews with scholars of Jewish history and Jewish writers the many stories of Jewish migration are explored, with a rarely covered look at the actual journeys to get here.

LINES FROM THE LIBRARY

Come in and see our new and very beautiful maple cabinets that were recently installed. The library will be making very good use of them and they go a long way in adding to the beauty and serenity of our wonderful BSTC library. Come in and see them.

And while you are visiting look for these books that are brand new, just for you and shelved on the library cart.

Life in a Jar. The Irena Sendler Project (Jack Meyer)

The story of a courageous Polish woman who put herself in harm's way countless times in trying to rescue Jewish children who were this saved. Like many others her heroism was suppressed by Communist Poland and remained unknown until three high school girls in rural Kansas stumbled across an enticing reference to her and her rescues. They fashioned her story into a play for a history project naming it Life in a Jar. This play while first seen in Kansas went on to be shown in many places in the U.S. and finally Poland. Thus Irena Sendler after more than 60 years became known to the world for the power of one person to change the world. She is now recognized as being among the righteous at *Yad Vashem*.

Pumpkinflowers: A Soldier's Story of a Forgotten War (Matti Friedman) The author, who is a journalist and a former member of the IDF, gives us a very up close view of his experiences in Southern Lebanon as well as a narrative of the last years of Israel's presence there.

The title comes from the name of one of the security zone's lonely outposts made up of fortified lookouts and surrounded by trenches and bare bunkers as well as Israeli radiomen jargon for the wounded (i.e. flowers). (Editor's note: several friends have recommended this book as a must read for me and looking over some of the reviews of this book, including that of the *NY Times*, Amazon, Good Reads etc., I can understand why.)

The Kiddush Ladies (Susan Sovayov) Naomi, Miriam and Becky, now gracefully approaching middle age, have been friends forever. For years they have been chopping, dicing and slicing preparing the Kiddush luncheon for the congregation. As Naomi says "if the soul of their small *shul*, B'nai Israel, rested in the sanctuary, its heartbeat emanated from the kitchen...the service brought them to the synagogue, but the food and the lunchtime fellowship made them a community."

Suddenly life pitches them some hard curve balls and each, in their own way, deal with the crises facing them. However, a long buried secret deals a nearly fatal wound to their friendship! A "must," read!

A Jew Grows in Brooklyn (Jake Ehrenreich)

How is it possible for the son of parents who spent the World War II years in a Siberian labor camp become a comedian? The author knows of Jews who write Christmas carols! He also does imitations of many "celebs" -Enough said, read it and find out!

Here and There: Leaving Hassidism, Keeping My Family (Chayah

Deitsch) A personal account of a woman raised as a Lubavitcher Chasid in Crown Heights (Brooklyn, NY) who, at a very early age felt estranged from her world and its strictures. Allowed to go to Barnard College she discovers a larger world with which to establish an identity completely alien to her family.

How she went her way, yet maintains ties with her family, makes for a fascinating "read".

Unorthodox: The Scandalous Rejection Of My Hasidic Roots is a memoir by Deborah Feldman of the Satmar sect of Chasidim in Brooklyn, NY. While what Ms. Feldman did was scandalous in the Satmar world, the book itself doesn't provide the drama and intrigue its title suggests. It does, however, provide an insight into this closed off society. (Note this book has been part of our library and can be found in the women's bio section. It is included here because of the subject matter's relationship to Deitch's book).

Fast (Tzom) of Tammuz

Tzom Tammuz, often called by its Hebrew *name Shiva Asar B'Tammuz*, is a minor Jewish fast day commemorating several calamitous events in Jewish history occurring on the 17th day of the Hebrew month of Tammuz. It marks the beginning of the three-week mourning period leading up to *Tisha B'Av* (Ninth of Av). Like other minor fasts, Tzom Tammuz begins at dawn (first light) and ends at nightfall (full dark).

The tragic events occurring on *Shiva Asar B'Tammuz* are laid out in the *Mishnah** and includes Moses breaking the tablets of the Ten Commandments given on Mount Sinai, the priests of the First Temple stopping offering the daily sacrifice (the *Tamid*) because Jerusalem was besieged and they ran out of sheep, and the breaching of the walls of the Second Temple

**Mishnah (repetition)* - the oral law in Judaism in contrast to the written Torah or Mosaic Law. It is said to have been collected and committed to writing about 200 AD and forms part of the Talmud. The Mishnah is the legal commentary on the Torah explaining how its commandments are to be carried out while the Talmud is discussions and commentaries on the Mishnah's laws.

Tisha B'Av

Tisha B'Av (or the "Ninth of the month Av) is an annual fast day commemorating the destruction of both the First and Second Temples in Jerusalem. These events occurred about 655 years apart, but on the same Hebrew calendar date. The Book of Lamentations, which mourns the destruction of Jerusalem, is read. The fast is never observed on Shabbat but is postponed to the next day or the 10th of Av. Since this fast is not a minor one, it starts at nightfall the day before and ends at nightfall the next day. The restrictions on Tisha B'Av are similar to those on Yom Kippur.

According to several Jewish sources, Tisha B'Av commemorates several other catastrophes including the expulsion of the Jews from England in 1290 and the 1492 banishment of the Jews from Spain.
