MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Welcome to June – a time of transition, growth, and reflection. As the days grow longer and the warmth of summer begins to embrace us, we are reminded of the cycles of life and the opportunities each season brings to deepen our connection with one another, with our faith, and with the world around us.

While we start out with the month celebrating Shavuot – a celebration of the giving of the Torah on Mount Sinai – we are also reminded of the many ancestors and friends who are no longer with us

Thus, June is a month that invites us to reflect on the themes of renewal and community. However, as we increasingly face a world in which being a Jew invites hatred and despair, I wonder how we can go beyond the senseless killing of Jews around the world. People are afraid of wearing signs of their Jewishness, whether it is a Magin David or a kippah. How do we fight this, how do we let people know that Israel is the only Democratic state in the middle east.

Unfortunately, it is becoming more difficult to demonstrate that as a sacred community, we mourn all people hurt in bombings and such. How do we answer the questions raised about our humanity. How do we let people know about the countless teaching in the torah of working together, extending kindness, compassion and understanding to those around us? And how can we ensure that our actions reflect the values of tikkun olam—repairing the world—that are so central to our faith?

I wish I had answers for this, but I know that we are

MESSAGE FROM RABBI NORM

Dear Friends,

I've been agonizing over writing these words for several months now; I've been reading, and webinaring, and consulting with teachers and colleagues. I have tried to keep a 'somewhat open mind', deferring to those much more wise and articulate than I. But, as I indicated to the BSTC Board of Trustees recently, I cannot remain silent.

The reminder in our Sacred Literature (Ecclesiastes) is: "For everything there is a season, and a time for every purpose under heaven – if there is a time for silence, then there also is a time to speak". Simply put, there is much too much that is happening in our world – and specifically in America and in Israel – that is destructive, exploitative, hateful, and ultimately, potentially fatal to our character, our human relationships (what the Rabbis refer to as'bein adam l'chavero'), and our hope for the future of our own and certainly future generations.

Our integrity as persons, and our purpose as being created in the Image of God, is to value and respect others, for in that concept, we demonstrate our belief in The Other. That is what Judaism teaches, consistently and clearly. Governmental actions that raise one person or group above others, or that deny equal rights and privileges, are unjust. Lying, avoiding accountability, misusing power for personal gain are all practices that our tradition deems immoral. Stereotyping, prejudicial restrictions, and dehumanizing have been used against us through the centuries – perhaps more than any other people. How dare we allow this wrong to be committed, so blatantly, in our day?

Rabbi's Message (continued)

I fear for our Country, the United States. Civil liberties are being trashed, democratic values (that's with a small "d") dissolved. Extreme positions for both left and right dominate the public discussion, with very few voices being raised or words printed that represent the "center". Who can proclaim the most ridiculous, dangerous accusation, or promote the weirdest theory? Who can tell the most lies – because we've apparently acquiesced to accepting them as being true? And, of course, once again, the Jews (often referred to as 'the Zionists') are either being blamed, or Anti-Semitism is being used as an invalid, inappropriate excuse for fanatical policies.

I fear for Israel, as well. Though I love her dearly, and pray daily for Israel and its neighbors to know Shalom, it is time to publicly state: "Dayeinu – Enough!" Along with more than 70% of the population there who are demanding, the ones who not only pray but live in the midst of Houthi and Yemenite and Hamas and Hizbullah rockets and terror attacks; the Government must stop its inhumane war against the people of Gaza. Netanyahu and his cronies feel empowered towards a plan of ethnic cleansing its inhabitants and settling their land. If that means continued fighting, or sadly, if that means that not one more hostage or body will be recovered, they will be content. But I, many like me around the world, and most significantly, hundreds of thousands of Israelis from all walks of life, protest every week against this war, crying in sympathy with all the bereaved families from this conflict.

[Rabbi Yehuda Kertzer of the Shalom Hartmann Institute in Jerusalem recently wrote: "Most of us . . . most Israelis, and most of us who support Israel from afar are stuck in a state of dreams arrested, waiting for a future that won't come if we can't even try to envision it."]

And one further example of the desperate level to which we have fallen: on Yom Hazikaron, Israel's Memorial Day (which leads immediately into Yom HaAtzmaut, Independence Day), a Progressive Synagogue in the Tel Aviv suburb of Ra'anana was hosting a screening of a video that included interviews about fallen Israeli soldiers, as well as other Jewish, Christian, Druze and Arab victims

of terror – caused by both Jewish and Palestinian extremists. The attendees and leaders of the Congregation were spat upon, hit by thrown stones, cursed and physically threatened, with several people hospitalized and 2 cars vandalized. This was truly a 2025 pogrom – instigated and directed by the local head of the Prime Minister's Likud Party, with the local police and security personnel advised in writing to "stand down". When the incident was brought to the Knesset for a condemnation vote, Netanyahu's coalition partners justified the action.

I will be sharing more of my fears and feelings – in the Shofar, in mailings and posts, and invitations for open discussions. But I will refrain from discussing this from the Bimah during Worship Services. Let our prayers speak for themselves, and for our hearts and souls during the sacred moments we share together on Shabbat and Yom Tov.

BOARD NOTES

The monthly Board meeting is normally held on the fourth Monday of each month. The next meeting is currently scheduled for Monday, June23rd at 10am.

RESTRICTED (DESIGNATED) ACCOUNTS

While no specification is required, when making a general donation or tribute to BSTC, you may opt to specify that to the general fund, or to some other fund that represents your desires regarding where the money is used.

Following here is a list of the Restricted Accounts we have on our books. Some have been there for a while, and some are new. The money can only be used for the stated purpose if an account is restricted (designated).

Rabbi Discretionary Fund: This will be a stand-

ard Discretionary fund to allow the Rabbi to donate as he sees appropriate.

- Gratitude Fund: This fund was set up in 2024, before Pesach. The price for the Seder dinner was considerably higher than it had been pre-COVID, when we had the Seder in-house, and a member of BSTC donated his time. All we had to pay for was the food. We were concerned that some of our members could not afford the higher price. Some members said "we are grateful that we can afford to allow any of our members to attend ritual events." This fund allows us to subsidize some or all the cost of rituals for our less fortunate members.
- Garden Fund: BSTC does have a budget for property maintenance. However, we may want to do something extra (special) for the garden, and this fund is for this.
- Bikur Cholim (Caring Meals) Fund: Recently, we have had many people whose spouse/partner has passed away. We want to help them through this grieving time by bringing them meals. We have expanded this to include people coming home from the hospital, or other such serious events. A group of us have decided that personally making meals available to help them through this trying time is a meaningful mission. We are thinking to have prepared meals available or give them certificates for Door Dash or the like. We will make food and store it in the BSTC freezer, all marked to indicate whether the meal is low-salt, gluten-free, vegetarian, etc. We will need money to buy the food, containers, and volunteers to help us cook.
- Art Gallery Fund: This one is obvious. While the Gallery Committee has a budget for expected costs (hanging devices, receptions, honorariums for speakers), the committee chairs can use this fund to enhance the gallery at their discretion.
- Membership Fund: This account is set up to support the recruitment of new members to our Temple, through various means of communication outside the temple. It would include, but not be restricted to, on-line, newspapers, radio, and TV informational posts; and meet-and-greet with the Community off site, as well as at the Temple.

TEMPLE TIDINGS

This poem, "A Prayer in the Face of Hate," was written in response to a violent antisemitic attack against Eli Tsives, a Jewish college student who was physically assaulted for openly expressing his Jewish identity. Amid a growing wave of campus antisemitism, the poem offers a spiritual and emotional response rooted in Jewish tradition, invoking the Shema, prayers for healing (refuah shlema), and the call to repair the world (tikkun olam). It honors Eli's courage and speaks to the pain, memory, and resilience of the Jewish people. The poem serves as both a prayer and a protest—grounding grief in faith and transforming fear into a powerful affirmation of presence, pride, and unyielding strength.

Shema,
we begin—
not with answers,
but with listening.
The ancient call:
Hear.
Feel.
Do not look away.

Shema,
we begin—
not with answers,

They struck him for standing with courage for calling himself

Jew.
For daring to wear a name carved by covenant, tempered in exile, brilliant with fire.

This is not new.
This is an echo—
of broken glass,

for Eli's bruises,
for every child who flinches at slurs,
for voices silenced in fear.
