The Beth Shalom Temple Center (BSTC) in Green Valley, Arizona recently celebrated a historic and joyous Simchat Torah holiday with the arrival of a brand-new Torah scroll, a precious addition to the community. This milestone, two years in the making, was made possible through the dedicated leadership of Rabbi Norman Roman, who is marking his 50th year of ordination. Rabbi Roman spearheaded the significant fundraising efforts and handled the intricate arrangements necessary to bring the Torah to BSTC, reflecting his commitment to the congregation's spiritual vitality.

A Torah scroll, the holiest object in Judaism, contains the first five books of the Hebrew Bible, carefully handwritten on parchment by expert scribes

following centuries-old traditions. Each scroll is a unique work of art and devotion, taking approximately a year to complete. For any congregation, but for ours, BSTC, a small congregation of individuals aged 55 and older, acquiring a new Torah is very significant. It symbolizes renewal, community strength, and a continued connection to Jewish heritage.

The Simchat Torah celebration was a truly inclusive and vibrant event. Rabbi Roman led the congregation in the exciting ceremony, reading the final portion of the Torah and then beginning anew with the first portion, symbolizing the unending cycle of study and devotion. In a powerful display of unity, the entire Torah scroll was unrolled around the sanctuary, with congregants and guests carefully holding its sacred parchment.

In a remarkable show of interfaith solidarity, the celebration was also attended by many local Christian clergy and community members, who were

instrumental in supporting the Torah's acquisition. Their presence and participation underscored the shared values of faith, community, and mutual respect that define Green Valley.

President Esther Levine Brill, who led the BSTC board carrying in the new Torah, emphasized the collaborative spirit that made this achievement possible. The joyous occasion highlighted not only the strength of the Jewish community but also the support and friendship of the broader Green Valley community.

With this new Torah, BSTC has gained more than a sacred scroll—it has a precious symbol of renewal and unity, ensuring that the traditions of Judaism will continue to inspire and guide many future generations in Green Valley. Rabbi Roman's tireless efforts and the enthusiastic participation of congregants and interfaith partners alike made this event a moment of profound significance and celebration.

Beth Shalom Temple Center recently embarked on a remarkable journey, commissioning a new Torah that has drawn our small congregation closer to our faith, our heritage, and each other. This wasn't just a ritual act; it was a journey that has forever deepened our connection to Judaism, our ancestors, and our community. With fewer than 200 members—mostly seniors—many had never been part of bringing a Torah to life. This unique opportunity brought joy, reflection, and unity. Supported by our Jewish and interfaith friends, we celebrated the Torah's ar-

rival, recognizing the sacredness of this milestone and the values we share.

Often called the "Tree of Life," the Torah is the heart of Judaism. It is more than an ancient text; it is our guide to spiritual, ethical, and communal life. Canonized largely during the Jewish exile in Persia, the Torah's stories, laws, and teachings have shaped Jewish life for millennia. Through its commandments, Jews are reminded of their identity, values, and covenant with God that binds generations. Its influence extends beyond Judaism, impacting Christianity and Islam, which draw from its core messages on morality, justice, and humanity.

In commissioning this new Torah, BSTC committed to a living legacy. This wasn't a simple or quick undertaking. Raising \$75,000, a considerable sum for our modest congregation, was a testament to the dedication and love within our community. For us, this was about more than acquiring a sacred text; it was about securing our faith's continuity for future generations. This Torah will be read by our children and grandchildren, linking them to the words and values that define Jewish identity. For many of us, it was the first time being directly involved in this ancient tradition, leaving an indelible mark on our hearts and deepening our sense of belonging.

The Torah's arrival was celebrated on Simchat Torah, October 25, marking the completion and renewal of the Torah-reading cycle. Our congregation

gathered in joy, holding the Torah, reading from it, and dancing with it. This moment was transformative for many, connecting us to the Torah's wisdom and the unbroken lineage of Jews who preserved it through exile and hardship. Personally, standing with the Torah was a moment of profound connection. I felt rooted in its words, a living link in a chain that stretches back thousands of years. The Torah, in many ways, is a doorway to Judaism. It invites us to explore who we are, what we believe, and how we are called to act.

Our journey wasn't just a Jewish one. The interfaith community of Green Valley stood by us throughout this process, offering support and celebrating the Torah's arrival. They joined us not only out of friendship but because they, too, find meaning in the Torah's teachings. The Torah's values—compassion, justice, and love—are universal, speaking to people of all backgrounds and beliefs. Our interfaith friends recognized the Torah's role as a foundation for ethical teachings in Judaism, Christianity, and Islam, understanding that the Jewish commitment to the Torah is also a commitment to shared values and a better world for all.

In commissioning this Torah, BSTC reaffirmed its dedication to both the Jewish community and the broader interfaith family that enriches us. Our new Torah will live as a reminder of our shared commitments, a testament to resilience and faith, and a guide for generations who will come after us. Rabbi Norman T. Roman, celebrating his 50th year of ordination, led us through this journey with wisdom and vision. Under his guidance, we have come to see that this Torah is not just a scroll—it is our collective soul, the heart of our community, and a lasting gift to those who follow.

As Jews, we believe that studying Torah brings its teachings to life, allowing each generation to uncover new meaning. This Torah has strengthened our bonds within BSTC and across our interfaith community, reminding us of our roots and connecting us to our faith more deeply. By sharing its wisdom and values, this project reaches beyond our walls, inviting all people in Green Valley—and beyond—to explore the powerful themes of justice, community, and love that the Torah embodies. It is a living legacy, a "Tree of Life" for our community, and a profound example of how faith can unite, inspire, and uplift us all.

SUMMARY OF WORK COMPLETED

Media Outreach:

• Published monthly *Shofar* newsletters featuring event updates, community highlights, and announcements.

- Promoted the Gala through email campaigns, social media, and traditional media:
- Created and voiced five 30-second radio ads aired on local and regional stations.
- Secured mentions on local TV and radio programs.

Social Media Management:

- Managed BSTC and Gala Facebook pages:
- Posts Created: 50+ posts in 2024.
- Engagement Metrics: 15,000+ views, 1,200 reactions, 180 comments, and 90 shares.
- **Boosted Posts:** Six paid advertisements to amplify event promotions.

Event Promotions:

• **Gala:** Promoted across all platforms, leading to 250 attendees.

Website Updates:

• Regularly updated the BSTC website with event calendars, Gala highlights, and Rabbi's messages.

CHALLENGES FACED

Lack of Volunteers:

 Recruiting and retaining communications workers has been challenging. While the committee is willing to train, consistent availability is needed.

Lack of Meetings:

 No formal meetings were held this year, relying on email and individual efforts to coordinate tasks.

Coordination Delays:

• Gathering content for newsletters and promotional materials required follow-ups, occasionally causing delays.

LESSONS LEARNED

Strategic Multimedia Use:

• A combination of traditional media (radio/TV) and digital platforms (social media and newsletters) has proven highly effective for outreach.

Affordable Photography:

Gala photos were critical in showcasing community spirit. Professional-quality photos are necessary, but professional photographers often charge \$1,000+ per event.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR THE REMAINDER OF 2024 AND 2025

Hanukkah Promotion:

- Finalize and execute Hanukkah promotional efforts:
- Social media posts and email campaigns.
- Announcements during services and flyers at community gatherings.
- Prepare high-quality photos and a post-event write-up for submission to **GVNews** to showcase the celebration and the community spirit.
- This cost-effective option provides professionalquality photos while staying within budget constraints.
- Events could include major holidays, fundraisers, and other key milestones.

Torah Promotion:

- Create a focused campaign for Torah promotion before the end of 2024:
- Include Torah-related stories, photos, and event promotions in the *Shofar* and on social media.
- Highlight any Torah readings, studies, or special events to engage the community.

Volunteer Recruitment and Training:

• Recruit and train communications volunteers to support committee activities in 2025.

NEXT STEPS

- Execute Hanukkah promotions and finalize postevent materials for submission to **GVNews**.
- Secure Sarah Gomez for event photography in 2025 with a \$1,000 budget allocation.
- Develop materials for Torah promotions to be rolled out before the end of 2024.
- Schedule a year-end meeting to evaluate 2024 efforts and finalize 2025 goals.
